

826 Boston College Readiness Internship

About the Opportunity

The **College Readiness Intern** will work alongside the **In-School Programs Coordinator** to wrap up in-school programming at two of our Boston Public partner Schools prior to summer break, administer surveys to teachers we work with, analyze end-of-year program data, and prepare and facilitate Summer College Essay Boot Camp sessions that take place throughout the summer.

This is an opportunity to learn about the day-to-day operations of a non-profit while working directly with students, making connections with educators and coworkers, building student engagement and mentoring skills, advancing your résumé, and acquiring excellent references.

From early-May through mid-August, the College Readiness Intern will work their in-person hours from our tutoring center during College Essay Boot Camp Sessions, which take place on Thursdays from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Applicants must be over the age of 18. The College Readiness Intern has a flexible commitment of 18–20 hours per week from May to August. The role requires candidates to be in-person at our BPS partner schools and at our tutoring center in Roxbury. Any remote tasks or projects will be assigned by the In-School Programs Coordinator and should amount to about 8 hours per week. Start and end dates will be determined with the In-School Programs Coordinator.

Interns who are not otherwise receiving financial compensation will receive a \$500 stipend after completing their internship. This position may be eligible for a Federal Work-Study partnership at some schools. If you are eligible for Federal Work-Study, please let us know and we will try to work with your school to see if we are an eligible community partner.

Candidates for this position should be prepared to work the majority of their hours in-person at one of 826 Boston's physical location(s). Please read more about our <u>Program Covid safety</u> <u>quidelines</u>. All team members must establish that they are fully vaccinated against Covid-19.

What you'll do:

- Assist supervisor with post-program data processing and End-Of-Year Presentation prep.
- Work with your supervisor to prepare for fall programming.
- Participate in individualized tutoring with students.
- Learn techniques for teaching college prep from facilitators.
- Prepare materials for College Essay Boot Camp sessions.

Potential Special Projects:

- Create new volunteer/service member campus-specific digital orientation materials.
- Create formal program observation and reflection materials for staff and volunteers.
- Learn and deliver a portion of a College Essay Boot Camp mini-lesson.
- Revamp College Essay Boot Camp volunteer training/orientation materials for fall.
- Finalize a partner school's anthology publication set to be published during the summer by offering support in collecting submissions, copyediting, etc.

Skills and experiences:

826 Boston recognizes that impostor syndrome and the confidence gap might prevent some applicants from applying. Few candidates will have all of the relevant experience listed below, but 826 Boston is committed to assessing candidates with transferable skills and a willingness to be trained for this role.

- Enthusiastic belief in the mission of 826 Boston as evidenced by a passion for writing and working with youth.
- Interest in supporting BPS high school students in the college preparation and application process.
- Strong written and verbal communication skills.
- Strong organizational skills and the ability to multitask.
- The ability to take direction, seek counsel when needed, proactively identify needs and opportunities, and propose programmatic innovations.
- Interest in teaching or working in urban and/or underserved communities preferred.
- Spanish bilingual and biliterate proficiency preferred.
